## Are You Getting All the Help You Can?

In addition to town welfare, people and families with low incomes may get help from:

- Financial Aid to Needy Families (FANF, formerly called TANF),
- <u>Food stamps (EBT)</u> also known as Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP),
- <u>Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled (APTD)</u>; <u>Aid to the Needy Blind (ANB)</u> or <u>Old Age Assistance (OAA)</u>,
- Fuel assistance, and/or
- WIC (Women, Infants & Children).

See the <u>NH Department of Health & Human Services</u> to apply for these and other types of benefits.

The Social Security Administration has two main programs that may help with cash or health care coverage:

- <u>Old Age, Survivors' & Disability Insurance (OASDI)</u> for retired or disabled workers, their dependents and survivors based on work history, or
- <u>Supplementary Security Income (SSI)</u> for the elderly, blind or disabled who don't have sufficient work history to qualify for OASDI based on income.
